Obituary of son - Charles O. Ackerson:

Charles O. Ackerson, 61, a lifelong Grays Harbor resident, died on Friday, Aug. 20, 1999, at his Aberdeen home. Mr. Ackerson was born on Dec. 29, 1937, in Aberdeen to Allan D. and Eileen (Parsons) Ackerson. He graduated from Wishkah High School in 1956 as valedictorian. Mr. Ackerson also played in high school football. Mr. Ackerson served in the US Army for two years, during which he was stationed in Germany. He graduated from Washington State University in 1962 with a degree in Mechanical Engineering. He worked at ITT Rayonier Pulp Mill in Hoquiam until it closed in 1994. In 1996, he began working for Harbor Tool Rentals in Aberdeen as a mechanic. In December of 1984, he married Jan Rhoads in Montesano. She survives at the family home in Aberdeen. He enjoyed working in his garden, where he made his own fertilizers. He also liked to help his grandchildren with their experiments. His interests included camping, fishing, the Seattle Mariners and the Seahawks. Besides his wife, Jan, he is survived by two sons, Charles of Lacey and Michael of Chehalis; a stepson, Steven Rhoads of Aberdeen; a stepdaughter, Debra Rhoads of Aberdeen; his mother, Eileen of Hoquiam; two sisters, Aleta Fuhrer of Hoquiam and Sheryl Sjogren of Longview and five grandchildren. Besides his father, Mr. Ackerson is preceded in death by a son, Craig, and a sister, Marleen Stutesman. There will be no funeral services. Arrangements are by the Coleman Mortuary of Hoquiam.

Marleen Marie Ackerson White Stutesman, 56, a longtime Grays Harbor area resident, died Sunday, May 14, 1995, at Hoquiam. An Aberdeen man has been charged with her killing. She was born May 9, 1939, in Aberdeen to Allan Delman and Eileen Mable (Parsons) Ackerson. She was raised in the Wishkah Valley, where she attended school, and was graduated from Wishkah High School in 1957, where she was salutatorian. She was a graduate of Grays Harbor College and worked for the Pacific Northwest Bell Telephone Co., and the Grays Harbor Paper Co. In 1958, she married Theodore White at the Wishkah Valley Church. They later divorced. In 1978, she began sculpting in metal and her work was shown at art shows around the region. Ill health forced her to quit sculpting in 1985. Friends and family remember her as an artistic person who wrote poems and short stories, and as someone who enjoyed the outdoors and her flower garden, often inducing wild flowers to grow in it. She had belonged to the Association of Western Pulp and Paper Workers, the Grays Harbor Chamber of Commerce and several art associations. Survivors include her son, Tedd A. White of Aberdeen, her daughter, Dorinda D. Kryschuk of Mackenzie, B.C.; her mother, Eileen Mable Ackerson of East Hoquiam; her brother, Charles O. Ackerson of Aberdeen; two sisters, Aleta Fuhrer of East Hoquiam and Sheryl Sjogren of Longview; and eight grandchildren. Her father died before her. A memory service is planned for 1 p.m. Wednesday in the South Aberdeen Baptist Church, 620 Fordney St. Family interment services will be held in St. John's Cemetery in Wishkah.
